<u>Outcome Statement:</u> Support the awareness and visibility of the First Steps system throughout the cluster to assist in the increased identification and referral of infants and toddlers.

## **Performance Standards:**

- 1. 1.4% of children served with an IFSP will be under the age of 1 year.
- 2. The population served will be comparable to the demographics of the cluster.
- 3. Appropriate and timely referrals are to be made to the SPOE from a variety of community partners.
- 4. 3% of the cluster's infants and toddlers population will be served\*.

<u>Performance Measures</u>: Profile reports and First Steps data system reports will be utilized in the measurement of this performance standard. Cluster will meet performance metrics if cluster child counts remain within .5% of the current count, up to the target.

**Present:** Jason Berty(CTC), Sarah Muir(Riley Hospital), Patti Sebanc(Sycamore Services), Nichole Kelley(Whites Residential and Family Services), Kjari Newell(CDHHE), Julie Rockwood(Parent), Pamela Humes(Covering Kids and Families), Holly Andria(Crossroads), Stacy Holmes (LPCC) and Katarina Groves (LPCC).

Agenda Items	Discussion	Action Items
Welcome & Introductions	The meeting was opened with introductions.	
Approval of Minutes	• Stacy directed everyone to review the last meeting's minutes. Patti made a motion to approve. Julie made a second motion. The group reached a consensus and the minutes were approved.	
Action Items Update	<ul> <li>Stacy informed the group that she is still looking into the Facebook options. Her concern remains the need to monitor the comments posted. Stacy shared that there is the option of creating a community page for the program would not be as interactive. Kjari said that she has created a community page for CDHHE. She noted that even though people would still be able to comment, they would not be able to post items.</li> <li>Rhonda not present to report whether she had found out if the health department Burmese translators might be available to translate some marketing materials or not.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Stacy will continue to investigate         Facebook options.</li> <li>Rhonda to look into Burmese translation through the health department.</li> </ul>
Data-SPOE	<ul> <li>Stacy directed the group to review the SPOE data provided.</li> <li>She pointed out that with the initiation of ISPOE, secondary referral source data seems to be unavailable. Not sure how to access information about how parents are finding out about the program.</li> <li>DCS referrals continue to increase which likely correlates to the ASQ questionnaires being mailed to families who are involved in DCS.</li> <li>Reviewing referral source data attempts to help the group determine whether adequate numbers of referrals are being received from a variety of sources. The group still questions how we will know whether an entity is referring as many children as that entity could/should be refer. Stacy pointed out that referrals form WIC and Head Start seem low, but maybe that is where the numbers should really be (?).</li> <li>Patti suggested that maybe the nutritionists who do</li> </ul>	Stacy will find out the referral fields for ISPOE.

- visits with families for Head Start and WIC should be notified to ensure they are aware of the program and referral process.
- Jason questioned whether the fields in ISPOE are the same for referral source? Stacy indicated that she is not sure and would have to check.
- Holly suggested contacting food pantries to make sure they have our information as they see so many at risk families. Connie Merkel and Jim Vento are both involved with pantries and could help get info to the right people.
- Kjari agreed and indicated that Gleaners would be a good one to contact.
- Stacy had the group review the referral numbers by county and the cluster as a whole. She also had the group review data demonstrating the percentages of children moving from the referral to intake, intake to IFS,P and the referral to IFSP.
- Referrals are up slightly and Johnson and Morgan counties have shown a sizeable increase lately. Julie asked if things tend to be slower during the holidays? Stacy indicated that that is a typical trend with an increase occurring after the holidays.
- A discussion ensued as to why the numbers are down in Marion? It would appear that this could be due to kids not being eligible for the program or they simply did not follow through with the program and were dropped.
- Jason pointed out that the numbers from referral through IFSP have been pretty consistent over the years as a whole.
- Patti questioned whether we were really serving all the kids that need services in Tipton? The numbers seem very low even for a smaller community. Stacy cautioned the group about making assumptions based on Tipton County data. The sample size is so small that it is difficulty to glean information from that county. Any change in the numbers Tipton serves affects the percentages greatly. Stacy also indicated that it can be more difficult to break through in this community, and they may be more suspect of the outside entities. Also, there is no longer a pediatrician in this county who would be a help in referrals.
- Sarah shared that a lot of the older kids that are seen at Riley are not taken to the doctor regularly. They don't have a medical home and are often taken to

	immediate care facilities. She wondered whether this is also the case with the younger kids.  • Patti questioned whether the new healthcare marketplace may be pricing people out of wanting to take kids to the doctor. They now have high deductibles which can cause a barrier. Pam indicated that there is no data out there to determine if this is in fact a new trend with healthcare access.	
Holdback	<ul> <li>Stacy informed the group that the most recent holdback has been submitted to the state.</li> <li>She pointed out that the cluster must serve 1.4% of children under the age of one and the cluster serves 1.8%.</li> <li>A distribution log is kept to log what materials are being distributed to various organizations in the cluster.</li> <li>Stacy told the group that she used census data from 2010 which is now dated information.</li> <li>Marion County is the driving force for high minority numbers in the cluster. The Hispanic population is also being served in greater proportion as compared to the general population. Sarah shared that there has been a big increase in Burmese families at Riley. Stacy confirmed that Cluster G is also experiencing an increase in that population.</li> <li>Stacy shared that there were no issues with appropriate and timely referrals for the cluster.</li> <li>Stacy shared that the council has been and will continue to strengthen the relationships with other community entities. She shared that she and Katarina sit on many Advisory boards throughout the cluster. She also discussed the collaboration that ids taking place in Tipton County with the THINK meeting. Patti said that she would check on a group that meets in Hendricks.</li> <li>Stacy shared that the cluster is required to serve 3% of the 0-3 year old population in the cluster. 2.5-3.5% is the state's "target" noted in the holdback. The cluster is serving 3.9%. The question was raised as to how to tackle this higher number? The federal government requires that we serve all children that meet eligibility and are in need of services. It is unclear how this number could be limited. Stacy shared that the language in the holdback has changed. Several years ago, language around this outcome required that at least 3% of the 0-3 population was served.
